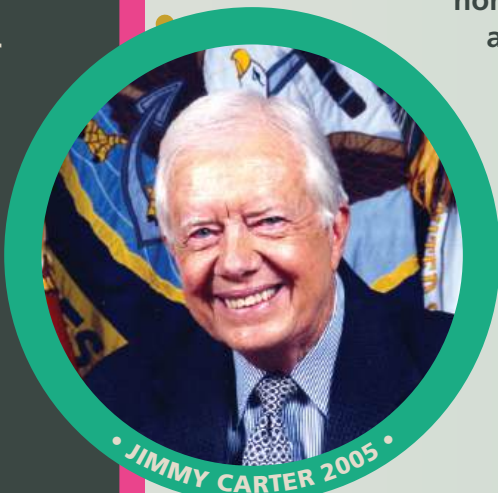

James Earl Carter, Jr.
(Jimmy Carter)

- Born October 1, 1924
- Grew up in and ran his presidential campaign from Plains, Georgia
- Georgia State Senator 1963-1967
- Governor of Georgia 1971-1975
- 39th President of the United States
- With wife Rosalynn, founded *The Carter Center* for peace and human rights
- Awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 2002

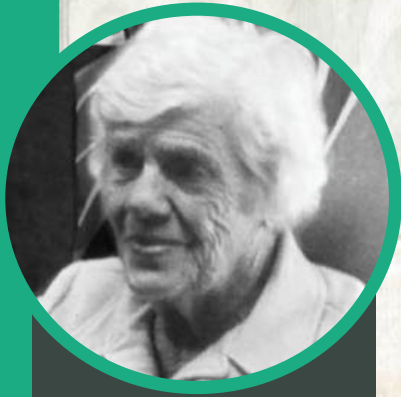

Lillian Gordy Carter

- Mother of 39th U.S. President, Jimmy Carter
- Along with husband James Earl Carter Sr., raised Jimmy and his siblings Gloria, Ruth, and Billy Carter on a farm in Archery, Georgia
- Worked as a respected registered nurse
- Defied segregation to give medical care to and socialize with African American residents of Archery
- Peace Corps Volunteer in India from age 68 to 70

Jimmy Carter grew up during the Great Depression, a time when many were poor and starving. Railroad “tramps” or “hobos” stopped in towns like Archery, Georgia, to look for work and food.

“One day, the lady from the next farm came to visit, and Mama commented on how many tramps she had helped that week. Mrs. Bacon said, ‘Well, I’m thankful that they never come in *my* yard.’

The next time we had some of the vagrant visitors, Mama asked why they had stopped at our house and not the others. After some hesitation, one of them said, ‘Ma’am, we have a set of symbols that we use, to show the attitude of each family along the road. The post on your mailbox is marked to say that you don’t turn people away or mistreat us.’ After they were gone, we went out and found some unobtrusive scratches; Mama told us not to change them.”

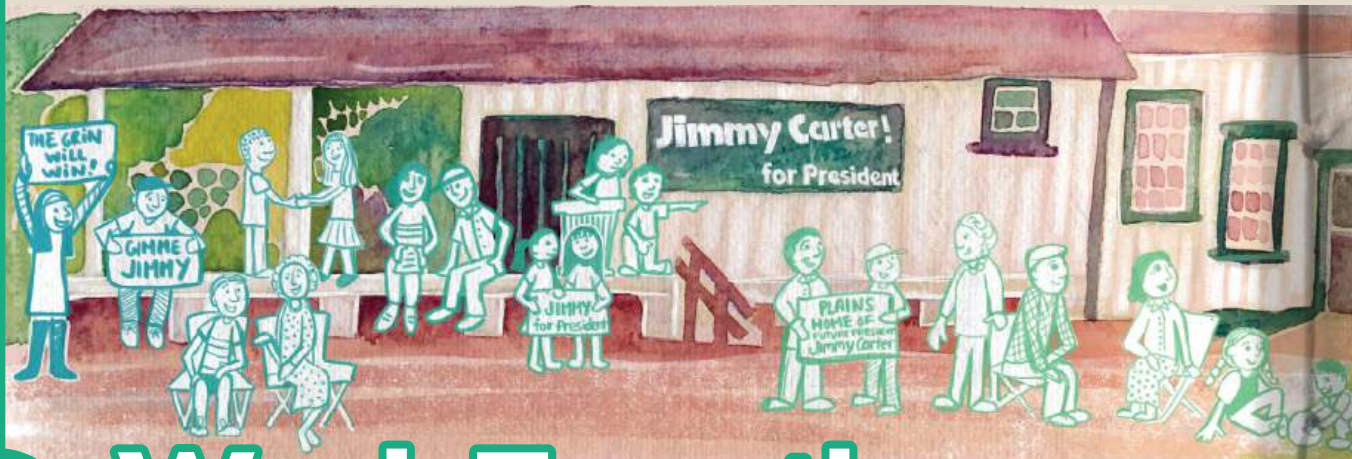

Jimmy Carter graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy in 1946 and started working with the Navy's nuclear submarine program. After Jimmy's father died, he and wife Rosalynn moved back to their hometown of Plains, Georgia. At the time it felt like a step backward, but it was the campaign work by the people of Plains that secured Carter's election to the White House!

- **decency:** behavior that shows respect to others
- **equality:** treating all people fairly
- **peace:** finding ways to agree, settling arguments without fighting.

While in the White House, she began a life-long fight for proper treatment and respect for people in need of mental health care. In 1982, Rosalynn and Jimmy co-founded The Carter Center, which works for human rights, health, democracy, and peace.

HEALTH

By making sure people have **clean water, medicine, and medical care**, we can help stop diseases and improve people's lives.

EQUALITY

Everyone should have the same **rights and opportunities**; no matter who you are or what you look like, you should be treated fairly.

PEACE

Instead of war and violence we should try to **resolve conflicts** (disagreements and problems) through treaties—agreements between governments.

DEMOCRACY

People around the world should have a fair government, where people choose their leaders through **elections** (voting).

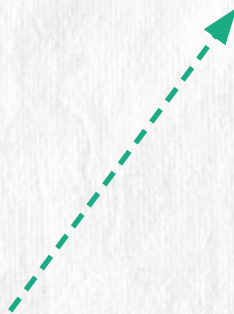
