





Education is Key.






Jimmy Carter's paintings depict beloved things: friends, family and scenes from nature. Above from left to right: cabin, belted kingfisher, and magnolia flowers.

HEALTH

By making sure people have clean water, medicine, and medical care, we can help stop diseases and improve people's lives.

EQUALITY

Everyone should have the same **rights** and **opportunities**; no matter who you are or what you look like, you should be treated fairly.

PEACE

Instead of war and violence we should try to **resolve conflicts** (disagreements and problems) through treaties—agreements between governments.

DEMOCRACY

People around the world should have a fair government, where people choose their leaders through **elections** (voting).
