




## Hatchie's Bridge (Davis Bridge) (TN007)



<b>Results</b>	Union victory

<b>Condition Statement</b>	Portions of landscape have been altered, but most essential features remain. The relatively undisturbed, rolling uplands

of the mountain gaps--Liberty, Hoover's, and Bellbuckle—  
provide excellent opportunities for preserving three combat areas  
and their settings.

### **Historical Designation**

Determination of Eligibility for the National Register of Historic Places, Liberty Gap Battlefield (1999). The Determination means that the Keeper of the National Register found the site to be historic and eligible to be listed, but because of private landowner objections to listing, the 2,422-acre site could not be officially entered into the National Register.





<b>Results</b>	Confederate victory
<b>Study Area</b>	2,068.23 acres Study area dramatically lengthened to take in Confederate approach and withdrawal as well as Union advance from Jackson.

<b>Condition Statement</b>	Despite development on the far western portion of battlefield, the remaining landscape presents an excellent opportunity for comprehensive preservation. The City of Jackson is growing steadily. The relatively unspoiled Core Area is threatened by industrial and residential development, and by logging operations.

Immediate public and private efforts to protect the Jackson battlefield are needed before the land is developed.
