

- Please don't add any graffiti to the ruins.
- Please stay out of the closed areas.
- Please leave artifacts where you find them.
- Please keep pets on a leash at all times and pick up after them.
- Please smoke only in the designated area in front of the visitor center.
- Please have lunch and snacks in the picnic area. Remember to put your garbage in the trash can. Don't share your food with the ground squirrels. They will eat it but it isn't good for them.
- Ask any Event Volunteer or Staff if you have any questions.





**Scheduled Performances** are at the “Main Stage” next to the Casa Grande. Go through the west gates or through the Visitor Center.

**Unscheduled Performances** are at the “Open Microphone” stage at the west end of the Exhibitor-Vendor booth area.

The **Exhibitor/Vendor** and **Food Service** areas offer a wide variety of beautiful hand-made crafts and delicious authentic O’odham food.

The **Visitor Center** includes a bookstore, museum and 15 - minute video.

## The Performers

**Scott August** is a nationally acclaimed flute player, keyboardist, composer, producer, and winner of the Native American Music Award.

**Gabriel Ayala**, a member of the Yaqui people of southern Arizona, performs classical guitar music both nationally and internationally.

**Randy Granger**, Winner of the 2009 Indian Summer Music Award in the Native American Flute category, appears at festivals and concerts throughout the country.

**Alex Maldonado** is a member of the Pascua Yaqui Nation. His flute artistry has earned him three nominations for the Native American Music Award.

**Flavio Martinez**, founder of the band NOSOTROS, also performs around the southwest as a soloist playing traditional flutes and panpipe flutes from South-America.

**Nathalie Picard** is a Native American flute player, storyteller, and singer from the Huron-Wendat Indian reservation in Canada who performs in the U.S., Canada and Europe.

**Loren Russell** is a flute player, storyteller and member of the Gila River Indian Community who presents stories from his own family history and other American Indian traditions.

**Travis Terry**, Native American flutist and popular recording artist, is a member of the Gila River Indian Community and Master of Ceremonies for this year’s Music Fest.

**River People Basket Dancers** are a traditional Akimel O’odham dance group from the Blackwater area of the Gila River Indian Community.

**Hashan-Kekh Traditional Dancers** from the Gila River Indian Community who perform a variety of traditional Akimel O’odham dances.
