In the Eisenhower living room, there are two items on top of the family organ. Find them and answer these questions...




- Describe these items, including who is in the photos, where the photos appear to have been taken (look for clues in the pictures themselves), and if you notice any additional details from the photo frames themselves.

#### In the entryway, find...





In the Eisenhower sitting room, find an item with this pattern...








## The Eisenhower Book Collection
