HISTORY

Interpretation, Education, and Volunteers (IEV) at Haleakalā National Park are responsible for telling the story of the place now known as Haleakalā National Park to the public. IEV develops interpretation based primarily on three themes which are derived from the resources of the park - 1. The geologic processes from which evolved the outstanding volcanic and erosional features of Haleakalā, 2. The unique and indigenous ecological systems which contain rare and native plants and birds and how these ecosystems developed within the microclimate, and 3. How Hawaiians used the park landscape and how they related to the geological and biological process which created it. IEV uses these themes to connect visitors to the resources in the hopes that they will take what they learned back to where they're from and connect them to the National Park Service as a whole. They work to find tangible, intangible, and universal themes that visitors can relate to in order to help them better understand the language of the resources. This work includes outreach initiatives, stewardship of the resources, compliant and appropriate signage throughout the park, relationship building within the community, field trips and classroom visits, public affairs and social media, and the management of youth programs and volunteers-in-parks (VIP).
