1 LBJ Ranch Tours begin at the LBJ State Park and Historic Site visitor center. Obtain a free driving permit. Bookstore. At the Sauer-Beckmann Living History Farm costumed interpreters carry out the day-to-day activities of a 1918 Texas-German farm.

2 Head Start—The program established during the Johnson administration continues for pre-school children in the local area. Originally located here.

3 Junction School—Four-year-old Lyndon learned to read at this one-room school located near his home. He returned as president 53 years later to sign the far-reaching Elementary and Secondary Education Act.

A Reconstructed Birthplace—
On August 27, 1908, the first child of Sam and Rebekah
Johnson was born at this site and named
"Lyndon Baines."
The house was rebuilt by the president in 1964 to be used as a

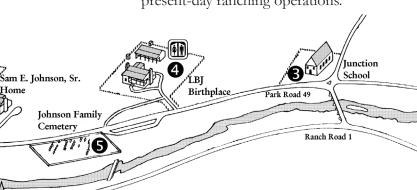
guest house.

Grandparents' Farmhouse—Sam Sr. and Eliza, the president's grandparents, whose first home had been in what is now called the Johnson Settlement (in Johnson City), lived out their lives in this modest farmhouse. Not open to the public.

7 Texas White House Complex–Currently undergoing rehabilitation. Closed to the public. Anticipated reopening in 2025. Lyndon Johnson acquired his aunt's ranch house in 1951. The home was a center of political activity for nearly 20 years. Johnson spent one-quarter of his presidency, 1963-1969, leading the nation from his ranch in Texas.

8 Show Barn—Built for the care and training of cattle, it continues to serve as the center for present-day ranching operations.
