

CODE OF FEDERAL REGULATIONS

TITLE 36, CHAPTER I

COMPENDIUM OF DESIGNATIONS, CLOSURES, REQUEST
REQUIREMENTS, AND OTHER RESTRICTIONS IMPOSED UNDER
THE DISCRETIONARY AUTHORITY OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

In accordance with regulations and the delegated authority provided to under the Discretionary Authority of the Park Superintendent in Title 36, Code of Federal Regulations, Chapter 1, Parts 1 through 7, the following regulatory provisions are established for the proper management, protection, government, and public use of the Natchez Trace Parkway under the jurisdiction of the National Park Service.

Unless otherwise stated, these regulatory provisions apply in addition to the requirements contained in Parts 1-7 of Title 36, Code of Federal Regulations.

Written determinations, which explain the reasoning behind the Superintendent's use of discretionary authority, are required by Section 1.5(c) and appear in this document in *italicized* print.

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CLOSURES AND PUBLIC USE LIMITS NATCHEZ TRACE PARKWAY

Under the provisions of Title 36, Code of Federal Regulations, Chapter 1, Parts 1-7, the following compendium of closures and public use limits are established for the Natchez Trace Parkway. Unless otherwise noted, these closures and use limits are in addition to the provisions contained in Parts 1-7 of Title 36, Code of Federal Regulations. The specific authority for these regulatory procedures is found in Sections 1.5, 1.6, and 1.7 of Title 36.

In addition to these regulations, the following are also provided:

Written determinations that explain the reasoning behind the Superintendent's use of discretionary authority are required by Section 1.5(c) and appear in this document as italicized print.

Section 1.6(f) states that a list of those activities that require a permit must be maintained. That list appears in this document under 1.6.

As required by 1.7(b), designations, closures, permit requirements, and other restrictions imposed under discretionary authority shall be updated annually and made available to the public upon request.

SECTION 1.4 DEFINITIONS

Unmanned Aircraft: The term "unmanned aircraft" means a device that is used or intended to be used for flight in the air without the possibility of direct human intervention from within or on the device, and the associated operational elements and components that are required for the pilot or system operator in command to operate or control the device (such as cameras, sensors, communication links). This term includes all types of devices that meet this definition (e.g. model airplanes, quadcopters, drones) that are

used for any purpose including for recreation or commerce.

All-Terrain Vehicle: The term "all-terrain vehicle" (ATV) means any motorized vessels or conveyance manufactured for recreational, non-highway, off-road, or all terrain use. ATV's would include, but are not limited to: four-wheelers, three-wheelers, UTV's, mini-bikes, dirt bikes, go-carts, scooters, etc.

Commercial Filming: The term "commercial filming" means digital or film recording of a visual image or sound recording by a person, business, or other entity for a market audience, such as for a documentary, television or feature film, advertisement, or similar project. Under P.L. 106-206 all commercial filming requires a permit and is subject to a location fee and cost recovery.

SECTION 1.5 CLOSURES AND PUBLIC USE LIMITS

(a)(1) The Tupelo Homestead areas (former residential areas near Parkway Headquarters) are closed to all public use except by permit.

For security purposes including loss prevention, employee safety, and visitor safety only authorized vehicles are permitted where signed.

(a)(1) Government owned facilities are for official use, and parking is for authorized vehicles only where designated. Unauthorized vehicles will be towed at the owner's expense.

For security purposes including loss prevention, employee safety, and visitor safety only authorized vehicles are permitted where signed.

(a)(1) Vehicle parking along the Ross Barnett Reservoir shoreline (MP 105-114) is permitted from a distance 20 feet from the road edge to the water line. The shoreline may be closed to off road vehicle travel as conditions dictate.

Reservoir Shoreline Closures are to control erosion, prevent rutting and damage to turf during the rainy season, and allow for natural recovery following heavy use periods. Vehicles must park at least 20 feet off the roadway to prevent rutting.

(a)(1) The following facilities are closed to picnicking:

All Natchez Trace Parkway maintenance areas
Meriwether Lewis Visitor Contact Station
Colbert Ferry Contact Station
Parkway Visitor Center
Chickasaw Village Site
Parkway Information Cabin (Ridgeland)
Mt. Locust Historic House and grounds
Rocky Springs Contact Station

Picnicking is prohibited in the listed areas to prevent unsanitary conditions and interference with normal visitor and employee activities. Natchez Trace Parkway employees may have picnics in maintenance areas for special occasions, i.e., holiday parties, retirement parties, Thanksgiving, etc.

(a)(1) Georgetown Cave will be closed to the public.

*In agreement with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Georgetown Cave is closed because of its designation as critical habitat of an endangered species of gray bat: *Myotis grisecens*.*

(a)(1) The Bailey Farm is closed except by special use permit.

The acquisition of the Bailey Farm and its future use is under study, planning, and design. Current use is limited to the agricultural lease program.

(a)(1) The Meriwether Lewis Ranger Station (former residential) is closed to the public from sunset to sunrise.

For security purposes including loss prevention, employee safety, and visitor safety this area is closed.

(a)(1) Areas of new construction and/or reconstruction and repair will be closed to the public as posted.

Areas of new construction and rehabilitation, under certain conditions, are closed to protect the visitor from a chance of injury where heavy equipment is in use and conditions are not safe. The closures safeguard the equipment and supplies of the contractor.

(a)(1) All firearm ranges are closed to public; ranges are for law enforcement use only.

The Natchez Trace Parkway does not allow firearm use. For the safety of visitors and employees, ranges are closed to the public.

(a)(1) The interior of the Gordon House is closed to the Public.

This closure protects the structure from vandalism.

(a)(1) Visiting hours for the following areas will be sunrise to sunset; overnight parking is prohibited.

The following areas are open from sunrise to 10:00PM to allow for star gazing.

Incidents of illegal activity have been recorded at many of these locations. These areas are closed at night to provide for security of archeological, historical, and cultural resources and visitor safety.

(a)(1) Wooded areas adjacent to the following sites and designated parking areas will be closed to pedestrian use except on officially designated trails:

Old Trace (Brashears Stand)
Bear Creek Mounds
Boyd Site
Bynum Mounds
Chickasaw Village
I-20 Turnout
Emerald Mound
Elizabeth Female Academy
Beech Springs Outdoor Classroom
Old Trace/Confederate Gravesites

Magnum Mounds
Pharr Mounds

Off-trail travel is prohibited for public health and safety reasons and to protect natural and cultural resources: See appendix II for closure areas.

(a)(1) The Beech Springs Outdoor Classroom (BSOC) area is closed to the public except by special use permit.

The BSOC is available for use only by special use permit. Special authorized use of this area will provide health and safety benefits to visitors needing to use the facility for youth education purposes, allow for the management and protection of government property, and promote an environment for achieving the NPS mission. The BSOC is designated as a National Park Service National Environmental Study Area.

(a)(1) All man-made structures, including but not limited to buildings and bridges, are closed to the public for the purpose of climbing, repelling, or any other similar activity.

Climbing and other similar activities are prohibited to prevent damage to structures and equipment on these structures and to protect visitors from injury.

(a)(1) No motor vehicle shall be parked on lands of the Natchez Trace Parkway for the purpose of providing the occupants access for hunting on adjacent lands.

No motor vehicle used for the purpose of hunting shall be parked on the Natchez Trace Parkway lands. This is in the interest of safety, protection of environmental values, protection of natural resources, and avoidance of conflict among visitor use activities.

(a)(1) No motor vehicle shall be parked on, nor boat launched from, lands administered by the Natchez Trace Parkway for the purpose of commercial fishing and diving.

Parking and boat launching for the purpose of commercial fishing and freshwater mussel diving are prohibited since these vehicles must use Park roads and facilities in the furtherance of a commercial operation.

(a)(1) Recreational sporting activities are prohibited on the following archeological sites unless authorized by the Superintendent: Emerald Mound, Mangum Mound, Boyd Mound, Bynum Mounds, Chickasaw Village, Pharr Mounds, and Bear Creek Mound.

All Natchez Trace Parkway American Indian sites are significant cultural resources. Engaging in recreational activities on the mounds by visitors offends American because it detracts from the mound's spiritual characteristics.

(a)(1) The use of ATV's, or similar devices, is prohibited on all lands administered by the Natchez Trace Parkway, unless the device is being used for administrative, agricultural, or maintenance purposes as approved by the Superintendent. (Note: Some adjacent landowners and their heirs and assigns may have special access rights by law, easements, or deed reservations.)

Off road vehicle use is prohibited on the Natchez Trace Parkway road. ATVs and similar devices, are manufactured for recreational, non-highway, off road, or all terrain travel and are not an appropriate use for a motor roadway. Off road use is also prohibited for the protection of natural and cultural resources to prevent harassment of wildlife, to destroy habitat, and to eliminate conflicts with visitors using allowed conveyances.

(a)(1) Non recreational and recreational hauling is further clarified. Hauling associated with recreational activities is intended to include activities such as camping, boating, horseback riding, and ATV use. Hauling of multiple pieces of recreational equipment on a single trailer is permitted provided the total vehicle and trailer length does not exceed 55 feet. Examples of recreational activities and their associated equipment that are authorized for hauling are antique vehicles (cars/trucks/tractors/carriages) and hot-air ballooning. Non recreational hauling encompasses those activities that are not

specifically recreational in nature. Hauling of household items, furniture, appliances, carpet, landscaping materials and/or equipment, and construction materials are but some of the more commonly transported items that are prohibited on the Parkway.

Parkways are not short county or metropolitan roadways serving local travel needs but rather protected interstate roadways traversing hundreds of miles of scenic and historical rural landscape. The Natchez Trace Parkway is a pleasure road and scenic byway through its entire length, and it is kept free of commercialization. Special regulations for the Natchez Trace Parkway are codified in 36 CFR 7.43. These regulations permit recreational use and hauling. Additionally, 36 CFR 5.6 restricts commercial vehicle use. Appendix I to the compendium provides a decision tree regarding hauling and vehicular use of the Natchez Trace Parkway.

(a)(1) Launching, landing, or operating an unmanned aircraft from or on lands and waters administered by the National Park Service within the boundaries of the Natchez Trace Parkway is prohibited except as approved in writing by the superintendent.

The compendium closures required to implement this interim policy are necessary to maintain public health and safety in units of the National Park System and to protect park resources and values until the NPS can determine whether specific uses of unmanned aircraft on land and waters administrated by the NPS are appropriate and will not cause unacceptable degradation of park resources and values. This closure by the superintendent implements Section 1.5 of NPS Management Policies 2006, which provides that a new form of park use may be allowed within a park only after a determination has been made in the professional judgment of the superintendent that it will not result in unacceptable impacts on park resources and values. When proposed park uses and the protection of park resources and values

conflict, the protection of resources and values must be predominant.

(a)(1) Specific areas within the Natchez Trace Parkway may be closed to visitors or both visitors and employees by posting appropriate signs when, in the opinion of the superintendent, there are conditions that warrant such a closure. These conditions may include, but are not limited to, extreme fire danger, fires, hazardous conditions, aviation operational needs, or construction. This determination is made for both visitor and employee safety.

The closure is to provide for visitor and employee safety and preclude interference with emergency and administrative operations by visitors.

(a)(1) Temporary closures may occur in areas where paleontological or archeological excavations are being conducted or where public access may endanger sensitive paleontological or archeological resources.

This closure precludes interference with paleontological and archeological excavations by visitors.

(a)(1) Closure of visitor use areas (campsites, trails, overlooks, or interpretive stops along the Parkway, etc.) may occur when necessary by posting appropriate signs to mitigate resource impacts associated with overuse, misuse, environmental, or health and safety issues.

These closures may be required for resource and visitor protection. Examples of this type of closure include closing social trails for re-vegetation, closing buildings due to safety issues, closing trails or campsites due to flooding or hazard trees.

(a)(1) Drivers of commercial passenger-carrying diesel fuel motor vehicles are prohibited from idling their engines while parked at any park location.

The noise and fumes caused by these engines severely impacts the natural experiences sought by many visitors.

(a)(2) People entering Parkway visitor centers and contact stations are required to be appropriately attired including wearing shirt and shoes.

To maintain a positive and comfortable environment for all visitors, a reasonable clothing standard must be established. Visitors are encouraged to wear clothing that is modest in nature to maintain a respectful visiting environment. The lack of shirt and shoes detracts from the overall environment of the visitor center and poses health risk; therefore, they are required.

SECTION 1.6 PERMITS

(a) In accordance with 36 C.F.R. 1.7, the following activities require special permits:
Research Specimens (Reference 2.5)
Scientific Research (Reference 2.5)
Overnight Camping Outside Campgrounds (Reference 2.10(a))
Audio Devices (Reference 2.12)
Aircraft and Air Delivery (Reference 2.17)
Explosives (Reference 2.38)
Special Events (Reference 2.50)
Public Assemblies, Meetings (Reference 2.51)
Sale or Distribution of Printed Matter (Reference 2.52)
Livestock Use and Agriculture (Reference 2.60(b))
Scattering of Human Ashes (Reference 2.60(b))
Advertisements (Reference 5.1)
Business Operations (Reference 5.3)
Commercial Photography and Filming* (Reference 5.5)
First Amendment Activities (Reference 2.51)

Permits will be specific in nature to the activity being permitted. In most cases, a special use permit or letter of authorization that is signed by the Superintendent and identifies the specific conditions under which

the permitted activity is authorized will be prepared. In all cases, a permit or letter of authorization must be in the permittee's possession at all times and exhibited to any authorized person upon request.

These permits are only those required by 36 C.F.R., Parts 1-7 and except section 1.5, need not be supported by a written determination unless required by the specific authorizing regulation.

See Appendix III for First Amendment sites.

**Commercial Filming: Generally, commercial photography and filming permits are not required for:*

- *A visitor using a camera and/or recording device for their own personal use and within normal visitation hours; and*
- *A commercial photographer not using a prop, model, or set, and staying within normal visitation hours; or*
- *Press coverage of breaking news. This never requires a permit, but is subject to the imposition of restrictions and conditions to protect Parkway resources and public health and safety and to prevent derogation of Parkway resources.*

SECTION 2.1 PRESERVATION OF NATURAL, CULTURAL, AND ARCHAEOLOGICAL RESOURCES

(a)(4) Dead wood on the ground may be collected for fuel in designated fire pits. Collection of wood shall be limited within Natchez Trace Parkway property to an area not more than 100 yards beyond campgrounds and picnic areas. Wood collected for fuel may not be removed from the campground or picnic area in which it is gathered.

The collection and use of limited amounts of wood by manual means for use within the Parkway enhances the visitor experience. As this collection occurs around developed

areas, the park benefits from the removal of fuels from areas typically protected from wildfire.

(c)(1) Gathering of fruits, berries, nuts, and pinestraw by hand for personal use or consumption is permitted. It is limited to one gallon per person, per day, of the following edible fruits, berries, and nuts:

Blueberries (*Vaccinium spp.*)
Blackberries/raspberries/dewberries (*Rubus spp.*)
Grapes (*Vitis spp.*)
Elderberries (*Sambucus spp.*)
Cherries/plums (*Prunus spp.*)
Serviceberries (*Amelanchier arborea*)
Pawpaw (*Asimina spp.*)
Mayhaw (*Crataegus opaca*)
Mulberry (*Morus spp.*)
Persimmons (*Diospyros virginiana*)
Black Walnuts (*Juglans nigra*)
Hickory/pecan nuts (*Carya spp.*)
American hazelnut (*Corylus americana*)

Two 30-gallon size trash bags per family/group per day of pinestraw may be gathered by hand, as long as mineral soil is not disturbed.

Climbing trees to gather fruits and nuts is prohibited.

Collecting small quantities of edible berries, nuts, fruit, and pinestraw specified herein causes no adverse impact on Parkway resources and increases the visitor experience. Taking of other plants, particularly when the entire plant is collected or uprooted, harms the species and is prohibited by regulations. Mushroom harvesting is only allowed under a federal research permit administered by the Natchez Trace Parkway.

SECTION 2.2 WILDLIFE PROTECTION

(a)(2) Deer calls, turkey calls, audio attractants, or other artificial or natural means of attracting or disturbing wildlife (including

but not limited to, rattling antlers, coyote, turkey, duck, goose calls, or verbal imitations) are prohibited.

Intentional disturbing of wildlife may adversely affect wildlife behavior (i.e. breeding and mating rituals, feeding habits, travel patterns/routes) possibly causing stressful and/or disruptive conditions for wildlife. Using calls can cause wildlife to leave foraging and mating areas and attract them to the roadway where they are more likely to become injured or killed. They may also become unnatural prey if artificially attracted out of cover.

(d) Lawfully taken game may be transported on the Natchez Trace Parkway provided it is concealed from view. Parking along the Parkway to access private or public hunting land or leases is not permitted.

Lawfully taken game may be transported on the Natchez Trace Parkway if concealed from public view since many hunters travel the Parkway as the most pleasing and direct route from their home to the areas where they hunt. Also, there are numerous crossings where county and local roads cross Parkway lands.

(e) All lands of the Natchez Trace Parkway are closed to the viewing of wildlife with an artificial light.

Viewing wildlife with an artificial light is prohibited to minimize poaching and the disturbing of wildlife.

SECTION 2.3 FISHING

(d)(2) Fishing regulations within the waters of the Natchez Trace Parkway are regulated by state laws. Possessing or using as bait for fishing in fresh waters is permitted in accordance to applicable state law provided the bait is not gathered on Natchez Trace Parkway land or waters.

Fishing licenses issued by the States of Mississippi, Alabama, and Tennessee are valid on all Parkway waters, in accordance with memoranda of concurrent jurisdiction with all states.

SECTION 2.10 CAMPING AND FOOD STORAGE

(a) Camping in designated campgrounds is limited to 14 consecutive days in any one campground and 30 days total Park-wide for a calendar year. Primitive camping not in designated sites may be allowed under certain conditions set by the Superintendent.

Only two pets are allowed in a campsite and must be on a leash, not exceeding six feet, or physically confined.

Camping is limited to 14 consecutive days to assure a greater turnover and to allow the campground vegetation to recover.

(a) Primitive camping is allowed for bicyclist and long-distance hikers at the following primitive campgrounds:

Shady Grove
Colbert Ferry
Beech Springs Outdoor Classroom
Witch Dance
Kosciusko Welcome Center

Primitive camping is allowed with approval of the Superintendent by permit for people on long-distance hiking and bicycle trips due to extreme distances between campgrounds.

SECTION 2.16 HORSES AND PACK ANIMALS

(g) The loading and unloading of horses and pack animals is permitted only at designated horse trailheads. A list of trailheads can be found on the Parkway website.

At unloading areas, spilled manure or fresh excrement must be placed in the trailer or scattered at least 100 feet from the area.

Loading and unloading horses in areas other than horse trail heads causes natural resource damage and leaves offensive wastes in visitor use areas where horses is prohibited.

All equine transported to or ridden on any park trail shall be accompanied by either the original or a copy of an official negative test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) (aka "Coggins test") administered within the previous 12 months. Proof of such test must be provided upon request.

A valid "Coggins Test" certificate is required, by state law, in each state by the owners of a horse or pack animal. All equine brought to, passing through, or ridden on any park trails, road shoulder, or any park lands shall be accompanied by either the original or a copy of a negative test certificate for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) or "Swamp Fever" or "Coggins." State requirements are a test within 12 months (6 months for Tennessee). This, pursuant to state law, is to stop the spread of EIA and other infectious diseases from livestock.

Only certified weed-free pellets and cubes, but no hay may be taken into and used in the backcountry. It is recommended that pack animals be on weed-free feed for 48 hours in advance of entering the Parkway.

The requirement that only processed feed be carried into the backcountry is intended to prevent the introduction or spread of non-native vegetation.

If an animal dies within the Parkway, it will be the owner or responsible person's responsibility to remove the carcass from the park or make arrangements for its proper disposal as soon as possible.

Horses and stock are considered property and are the responsibility of the owners to remove from Parkway property.

Stock may not be tied directly to trees.

The requirement to tether or picket stock is to prevent damage to live trees or shrubs and is intended to protect the root system, bark, and foliage from excessive damage that can occur if livestock is left restrained in one area for an extended period.

SECTION 2.20 SKATING, SKATEBOARDS, AND SIMILAR DEVICES

In-line skating, non-motorized scooters, skateboards, and similar devices are permitted on designated multi-use trails from the Reservoir Overlook (Milepost 105.6) to Milepost 96) in the Jackson-Clinton area only.

The Natchez Trace Parkway Multi-Use Trail is designed for a variety of recreational activities, which separates visitors from high volume motor vehicle traffic on the Parkway. In accordance with 36 CFR 2.20 Skating and 4.30 Bicycles, and the NATR Multi-Use Trail Environmental Assessment study, designated recreational uses in this developed area include cycling, walking, jogging, skating, skateboards, and non-motorized scooters. Horseback riding and the use of motorized vehicles are prohibited. The use of segways, motorized wheel-chairs, and similar devices are permitted to be used by persons in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. For safety purposes these devices are required to travel at a walking pace.

SECTION 2.21 SMOKING

Smoking is prohibited in all buildings on the Natchez Trace Parkway.

Smoking is prohibited within 25 feet of any entrance or exit primarily accessed by the visiting public. Smoking is also prohibited where smoke could travel through doorways,

windows, air ducts, or other openings. The only exception would be the dispatch building when only one dispatcher is on duty. In that case, dispatchers must smoke outside the building. Departmental Manual 2, Section 310, Chapter 11, Director's Order #50D: Smoking Policy.

SECTION 2.22 PROPERTY

(a)(2) Upon notification to the Superintendent, visitors on extended hikes, bicycle rides, or boat tours, are permitted to leave vehicles unattended for the duration of their trip. The Superintendent may authorize the leaving of unattended property and vehicles for other authorized purposes.

Visitors on authorized biking and hiking trips on the Parkway are permitted to leave vehicles unattended due to length of time required for trips. These visitors are required to notify park management of their vehicle location and estimated length of parking. The Parkway is not responsible for the vehicles or their contents.

SECTION 3.21 SWIMMING AND BATHING

(b) The following areas are closed to swimming and bathing:
Colbert Ferry
Coles Creek
Jackson Falls

Colbert Ferry is closed due to periodic water quality concerns. Coles Creek is closed due to several drownings that have occurred at that location. Jackson Falls is closed to prevent resource damage and enhance safety.


SECTION 4.21 SPEED LIMITS

(c) The speed limit on the Natchez Trace Parkway is 50 miles per hour (m.p.h.) except as posted.

The maximum speed limit set forth by 36 C.F.R. in National Park sites is 45 m.p.h. except where this speed is unreasonable. The design of the Parkway allows for safe speed in excess of 45 m.p.h., except where otherwise posted.

Appendix I

Vehicle, Hauling, and Towing Decision Tree



Trailers are authorized if they meet the following conditions:

- Towing vehicle and trailer cannot exceed 55 feet in length.
- Enclosed utility trailers cannot exceed 5 feet by 8 feet.
- Trailers shall be equipped with tail lights, brake lights, and turn signals.
- Trailers must display license plates according to state of registration.
- Empty trailers are prohibited.
- Only one trailer may be towed by another vehicle at any time.

Requirements for towing a vehicle:

- Towing vehicle and towed vehicle cannot exceed 55 feet in length.
- Steel tow bar mounted through the use of a towing receiver with retainers and safety chains are required.
- All towed vehicles must be equipped with tail lights, brake lights, and turn signals.
- No commercial vehicles are allowed without a Commercial Use Authorization. A Commercial Use Authorization may be applied for through the Chief Ranger's Office.

Examples of Prohibited Commercial Vehicles



Appendix III First Amendment Areas

Leipers Fork – Milepost 429

Physical Description and Area Location: Leipers Fork District Office Facility on the south side adjacent and parallel to the district office parking area.

Area #1: Concrete pedestrian sidewalk running east and west along the parking area's north side. The area of sidewalk designated will be the first 39 feet eastward from the west parking lot corner as provided in the photograph. The area will measure 39 feet by six feet providing 234 square feet of available space.

Area #2: Concrete pedestrian sidewalk running east and west along the parking area's south side. The area of sidewalk designated will be the first 39 feet eastward from the west parking lot corner as provided in the photograph. The area will measure 39 feet by six feet providing 234 square feet of available space.



Meriwether Lewis - Milepost 385.9

Physical Description and Area Location: Meriwether Lewis Historic Site mile post 385.9

Description: Located at the Meriwether Lewis restroom parking area, the areas designated shall be 20 feet by 10 feet located on the northwest and southwest ends of the parking lot. Each area will be two parking spaces in size. The red boxes in the diagram below represent the locations. Authorized activities cannot interfere with or impede pedestrian traffic on the sidewalk.



Colbert Ferry Visitor Contact Station- Milepost 327.3

Physical Description and Area Location: The Cherokee Sub-District of the Natchez Trace Parkway has designated an area at the Colbert Ferry Visitor Contact Station as a location for First Amendment demonstrations. Demonstrations cannot interfere with the public use of the information station and comfort station by other park visitors.

The demonstration area includes the first two parking spaces at the north end of the Visitor Contact parking area, and the last two parking spaces at the south end of the Visitor Center contact parking area.



Tupelo Battlefield – Main St. Tupelo Mississippi

Physical Description and Area Location: The areas are located adjacent to the northeast and northwest corners of the Battlefield along Main Street.

The areas consist of two rectangles approximately 25 feet by 40 feet as shown below.



Natchez Trace Parkway Visitor Center and Headquarters – Milepost 266.6

Physical Description and Area Location: The area is located adjacent to the northeast corner of the Visitor Center parking lot and sidewalk. The area consists of two 10 feet by 70 feet rectangles, in the grass, adjacent to the sidewalk as follows:

Area #1: From the point of the northeast corner of the sidewalk at the northeast corner of the Visitor Center parking area extending easterly 10 feet, then turning roughly southerly for 70 feet running parallel to the sidewalk, then turning westerly 10 feet to the eastern edge of the sidewalk, then turning northerly and running along the eastern edge of the sidewalk to the starting point at the northeast corner of the sidewalk.

Area#2: From the point of the southeast corner of the sidewalk at the southeast corner of the Visitor Center parking area extending easterly 10 feet, then turning roughly south for 70 feet running parallel to the sidewalk, then turning westerly 10 feet to the eastern edge of the sidewalk, then turning northerly and running along the eastern edge of the sidewalk to the starting point at the southeast corner of the sidewalk.




Jeff Busby Campground – Milepost 193.1

Physical Description and Site Location: Located at the Jeff Busby Park (milepost 193.1), the First Amendment Area is designated as the 130 feet by 30 feet parking area located at the southeast corner of the service station.

Area #1 is designated as a 30 feet by 30 feet section at the southwest end of the parking lot.

Area #2 is a 30 feet by 30 feet section at the northeast end of the parking lot.

Ridgeland Information Cabin – Milepost 102.4

Physical Description and Area Location: Located at the Ridgeland Information Cabin the areas designated shall be 20 feet by 10 feet areas located on the East and West ends of the parking lot. Each area will be two parking spaces in size. The red boxes in the diagram below represent the locations. Authorized activities cannot interfere with or impede pedestrian traffic on the sidewalk.



Rocky Springs Contact Station – Milepost 55.8

Physical Description and Area Location:

Area#1: Located adjacent to the southeast corner of the Rocky Springs contact station. It is bordered by the sidewalk and is 25 feet by 50 feet.

Area #2: Located adjacent to the southwest corner of the Rocky Springs contact station. It is bordered by the sidewalk and is 25 feet by 50 feet.



Mount Locust Visitor Center – Milepost 15.5

Physical Description and Area Location: The Mount Locust Visitor Center area located in the parking lot.

Area #1 is located on the southwest corner of the parking lot's first three parking spaces next to the medium.

Area #2 is located on the Northwest end of the parking lot and is made up of the first three spaces of the parking lot. The red boxes on the diagram below are representations of the areas. Authorized activities cannot interfere with or impede pedestrian traffic on the sidewalk.



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
