



- 3. Name three former uses of the National Park Visitor Center.
- 4. Name three ports New Bedford whalemen visited on a whaling voyage.
- 5. What year did the whaling industry reach its peak, with more than 329 ships valued at \$12 million (about \$250 million today) and employing 10,000 seamen?
- 6. Who wrote, "For many years past the whale-ship has been the pioneer in ferreting out the remotest and least known parts of the earth"?






International Marine Signal Flags

The flags below are called International Marine Signal Flags These flags are used by ships at sea to spell out short messages and, in combination, to create special meanings, for example S-O-S. Each flag represents a letter of the alphabet.




Ranger Activity



Junior Ranger Log

Usually, one officer on a whaling ship was in charge of keeping a daily "log" of the whaling voyage. The "log" was the written record of the ship's speed, progress, and position, and included noteworthy events of the day.
