Personally appeared before me John Pewbeston Clerk of the County within and for said County and State, Abraham H. Cross who is personally known to me. Who being by me duly sworn deosis and says, that, he was Captian of Company "G" 2nd Regt. Tennessee Vols. that for five years next before his enlistment into said Regiment his Post Office address was Huntsville, Scott County, Tennessee. that his place of residence was about twelve miles from Huntsville and nearly south. I was a farmer and did farm land upon my farm on Brimstone Creek. There has been no change in my residence as I now occupy the same farm, and have been a farmer since the war and have performed some manuel labor since I was discharged from the army in the way of light farm work. I was first taken sick at Flat Lick, Kentucky, about March 1862, and soon thereafter I was afflicted with swelling of my legs or Imflammatory Rheumatism, and again awhile passing Cane City, Kentucky, on the train was assaulted by Rebels and struck over the eye and nigh temple with a brick bat, and my skull crushed, and also at the same time my skull was crushed in, on the back or upper part of my head near the crown, on turn of hair, I was knocked down, and was either hit twice or the latter was done by the fall against some iron or hard substance with sharp corner, the train was just starting or moving out, and the parties were rather behind a fever, and I suppose in ambush for some muschief to the train, which was conveying a great many Federate soldiers. I did not know the parties; and in consequence of said licks in the head and serious fractures of the skull bone my hearing and memory was permanently and seriously impaired; and for some time after the injury when I would cough or sneeze, it appeared like the air would blow out of my head, and a very strange sensation of the noze was produced, over my right eye and temple then was seemed pieces of bones extracted. These injuries were recieved about the 10th day of January 1863, when we arrived at Nashville, Tennessee. I was treated by Dr. Thomas Lea who died around five or six years ago at Kingston, Tennessee and also by some other Doctor whose name I do not remember on about the 10th day of March 1863 I was discharged from the army in consequence of said wounds, my discharge showing "on account of disability" and not able for duty. I was not treated by any other physician for the ? I called on Dr. Sinkneath at Kingston, Tennessee for medicine, and gave him the case, and he said he had nothing that would offer relief to that kind of distress. There has seemed to be a noise in my ears ever since, sound similar to crickets at the evening, and when I got too hot or too cold then stone deafness increases until I hardly hear any sound of ordinary tones of voices, and have to be spoken too in loud tones before I can understand, I have always had this deafness since I recieved this blows, prior to that time my hearing was excellent and my memory is and has been very defective since the blow's and both my hearing and memory are gradually growing worse. I have not suffered from any attacks of acute diseases since my discharges and has not required suidisal treatment.

Has performed some light manuel farm labor since his discharge but no hard labor and is doing any labor has always had to use great care not to get to hot and often only worked a little while during the day. In consequence of becoming so deaf and also offsetting my eye sight when to hot but at no time has been sholly disabled but does not think he had been able to do more than one fourth the labor required of a laborer such a great portion of the time to do any labor at all gave him pain and suffering of the heart.

He swears he was well and personally acquainted with A.H. Cross for 35 years and knows him to be a healthful man when he enlisted the service of Company "G" 2 Regiment Tennessee Vols. Infantry in the late war of 1861 and 1862 and that he was discharged from service about the last days of January or the 1st of February 1863 by reason of resignation. He further states that about the 20th January 1863 Cross came to him at Nashville, Tennessee and was badly hurt from a blow from the enemy which he had just recieved the day before he arrived at Nashville, a wound on his forehead dangerosley bad. James states he roomed with Cross 5 or 6 days and Doctor McMilin and any doctor was sent for once to repair Cross. Young states he was a soldier first Capt. Co. "B", 5 Regiment then Leutinant Col. of the same Regiment. He saw Cross frequently during his term of service. He further swears he is not interested in this matter and his last office is at Perrigotan, Tennessee. He further declares that he has no interest in said case and is not concerned in its prosecution.

On this 1st day of December A.D., one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine personally appeared before me John Perriberton Clerk; the same being a Court of the Record of the County and State aforesaid Abraham H. Cross a resident of Huntsville, County of Scott of Tennessee who being by me duly sworn according to law, on his solemn oath deposes as follows, to wit:

"I am the identical Abraham H. Cross who was enrolled on the 11 day of October 1861 in Company G of the 2nd Reg't of Tennessee Vol's., commanded by myself and I was honorably discharged at Nashville, Tennessee on the 10 day of March 1863 and my age is now 75 years. While in the service aforesaid and in the line of my duty I received the following disability, to wit:

In March 1862, at Flat Lick, Kentucky, I was taken sick, and soon after I became affected with a swelling in my legs and rheumatism. On or about January 10th 1863 in route from Louisville, Kentucky to Nashville, Tennessee our train was assaulted by the rebels at Cave City, Kentucky. I was struck over right eye with a brick bat which fractured my skull; said injury has greatly impaired my memory and hearing. I claim pension on rheumatism and injury to head, received and contracted in the U.S. service.

I have never been employed in the Military or Naval Service of the United States otherwise than set forth above since leaving the service. I have resided in Scott County, Tennessee and my occupation has been farmer before my entry into the service aforesaid. I was of good, sound physical health, being at enrollment a farmer and I am now partially disabled from obtaining my subsistance by manual labor by reason of my disabilities above state, recieved in the service of the United States, and I have this statement sumitted of being placed on the Invalid Pension Roll of the United States. I hereby appoint and empower, with full power of substitution, Nathan W. Fitzgerald, of Washington City, D.C. my true and lawfull attorney to prosecute my claim. My Post Office address is Huntsville, County of Scott, State Of Tennessee."

Before me the undersigned authority personally appeared Freemotor Young, of Kingston, Post Office, Tennessee, late Lt. Col., 5th Tennessee Infantry, whom I certify to be respectable and entitled to credit, who being duly sworn according to law desposed as follows:

I have known Abraham H. Cross, late Captian Company G, 2nd Tennessee Infantry since 1837, and up to the date of his enlistment, he was free from any injury to his head. I was sick in the Nashville, Tennessee, in February 1863, and on or about the 15th of said month, Captian Cross had a surgical operation performed on his head by Dr. A.T. Lea, late Surg. - 5th Tennessee Infantry, and Dr. Carr W. McMillian, Surgeion 1st Tennessee Infantry, which was performed in my room, after which the Captian roomed with me. I did not know the Captian when he first came in, his head was so bruised up. His forehead was black, and his face discolored. I saw the operation performed by the above -- named surgeon who had been left in Nashville to attend to the Tennessee soldiers. Dr. A.T. Lea is dead, and I have been informed that Dr. McMillin is also dead. The Captian stated to me that while on his way from Louisville, Kentucky to Nashville, on the train, he had been struck with a stone or brickbat in the head, thrown by some one on the outside of the car, which stone or birckbat was thrown through the window of the car, that the blow rendered him senseless and that in falling back, or in some other manner he could not explain, his head, on the backside, was mashed in. The dent can be felt in his head now. I have no interest in this matter.

William C. Burnett, Co. "C". Enrolled at Athens, August 20; mustered in November 21, 1864; mustered out at Knoxville, June 27, 1865.

Lewis Collins, Co. "D". Enrolled at Athens, October and November; mustered in November 29, 1864.

Thomas P. Duggan, Co. "E". Forty-five men mustered in at Athens, November 29, forty-two at Nashville, March 7, 1865. Most of the men had enrolled at Athens.

Charles W. Cross, Co. "F". Enrolled at Clinton, Anderson County, November 8, 1864; mustered in at Nashville, March 7, 1865.

Samuel W. Lindell, Co. "G". Enrolled at Clinton, and at Jacksboro, Campbell County in November 1864; mustered in at Nashville, March 7, 1865.

Jonathan E. Woods, Co. "H". Enrolled at Athens, January - March; mustered in at Nashville, March 18, 1865.

James H. Galbraith, Co. "I". Enrolled at Clinton, November 8, 1864; mustered in at Nashville, May 4, 1865.

The report of Adjutant General James P. Brownlow, State of Tennessee, says the regiment was recruited in Anderson, Knox, Campbell, Meigs and Monroe Counties. At the time of organization there were only four companies, and part of a fifth. Major John McGaughey was evidently the first field officer, but he was captured on January 29, 1865, and does not appear on the muster rolls of the regiment. Lieutenant Colonel Dail was commissioned January 1, 1865, and Major Dodson on April 22, 1865.

The regiment was stationed at Athens, Tennessee during most of its period of service. On January 29, 1865, George W. Ross, Lieutenant and Regimental Quartermaster, reported: "We were attacked yesterday by 300 rebels of Vaughn's, Wheeler's, and bushwhacker commands, and repulsed them from the town, but they captured some 20 or 25 of our men, including Major John McGaughey. They retreated from the town in the evening and remained all night seven miles from here, and rumor says they are going to make another attack in connection with about the same force that came to Madisonville yesterday." He requested that two companies of the 2nd Ohio Heavy Artillery, with two pieces of cannon be sent to Athens.

In response to this request, Captain Thomas A. Stevenson, 2nd Ohio Heavy Artillery was placed in command of an expedition sent from Knoxville. He reported "We arrived at 2:35 P.M. (January 30). The garrison, composed of a part of the 7th Tennessee Mounted Infantry, about 500 men, were scattered through the town and the country, a greater portion of them having disappeared in the timber on the approach of the enemy the day previously and had not yet returned. From the best information we learned that about 200 guerrillas dashed into the place the day before about 1:00 P.M., and that they were in

the public square before the garrison knew it; that they remained three hours, and drew off at their leisure without doing any injury to the town."

On March 2, 1865, Captian Cochran, commanding the post, reported a skirmish on the road to Philadelphia, Tennessee. On March 11, the regiment was directed to report by letter to Major General George Stoneman, Commanding District of East Tennessee. On March 17, he assigned the regiment to Colonel H.G. Gibson's 2nd Brigade, 4th Division, Department of the Cumberland. The regiment at this time was reported as consisting of eight companies, under Lieutenant Colonel James J. Dail.

On March 21, Lieutenant Colonel Dail was ordered to proceed with all effective forces from Athens, and distribute his forces at the several passes through the mountains east of Athens. The unarmed men were to be left at Athens. This was during the time of General Stoneman's expedition from East Tennessee into Virginia and western North Carolina.

On May 1, 1865, Captain Cross was ordered to proceed with his company to Clinton, Anderson County, and assist the sheriff in the execution of the civil laws. The balance of the regiment continued on duty at the mountain passes until July 27, 1865, when the regiment was mustered out.

Alvan C. Gillem was appointed colonel of this regiment May 13, 1862, at which time only three companies had been mustered into service. It was first reported in the Official Records on June 10, 1862, in Brigadier General Ebenezer Dumont's Independent Brigade, District of the Ohio. On June 14, 1862, Colonel Stanley Matthews, at Nashville, reported there was no troops in Nashville except the Provost Guard and the "unorganized" First Tennessee Regiment (Governor's Guards)."

A letter from Captain Oliver D. Greene, Assistant Adjutant General, dated July 17, 1862, gives some indication of the circumstances under which the regiment was organized. "The house you inquire about belonged to Colonel Heiman, of the rebel army and was taken possession of by the military authorities for sequestration under act of Congress August 6, 1861. During my absence Governor Johnson ordered the provost marshal to give the keys to a Major Thurneck, of the First Tennessee Volunteers, then being raised here. On my return, finding that Major Thorneck with his family was living in the house, although his regiment was under canvas, and knowing your orders about officers living with their men, I telegraphed to know if that order was still in force. I found it was, and verbally directed Major Thurneck that he must live with his men. No attention was paid, on the grounds that the regiment was not in U.S. Service and not liable to the United States Authorities. Finding that many other officers of the same regiment were making preparations to bring their families to live in houses under the same circumstances, and

recognizing the injury to the service which must arise, I directed the provost marshal to cause the house to be vacated, as also other houses occupied by soldiers and officers without authority from these headquarters. The order was promptly executed by the provost marshal in all instances except Major Thurneck and the quartermaster of the same regiment. The latter claimed that he rented his house. Major Thurneck held on to his house by false representations - that his children and wife were so sick that removal would report ~~thor~~ ~~the~~ ~~facts~~ I directed Colonel Campbell to have him ejected as occupying a house in possession of the United States without civil authority. He refused to obey the order. The order was reiterated peremptorily, and he peremptorily refused to obey the second order. He was arrested; and his lieutenant colonel obeyed the order at once. I am sure that if any officer in the department not directly interested had examined the matter and reported, my action would have been approved." By way of footnote, it might be added that Major Thurneck resigned in September, 1862, and Governor Johnson requested that Captian Greene be ordered elsewhere.

The regiment, as the 10th Tennessee Infantry, was reported as part of the Post Forces of Nashville on October 8, 1862. In January, 1863, in the organization of the XIV Corps, the regiment was reported as unattached to any brigade.

On May 3, 1863, Major General W.S. Rosecrans wrote the Adjutant General, U.S. Army: "I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of a letter from the Secretary of War to the General in Chief, directing that Colonel Gillem's First Tennessee Infantry be detached from general service and placed under the ~~command of~~ ~~the~~ ~~regiment~~ ~~at~~ ~~Nashville~~ ~~and~~ ~~Northwestern~~ ~~Railroad~~ of the Nashville and Northwestern Railroad.

On January 2, 1864, the regiment was assigned to the 1st Brigade, District of Nashville, of the XII Corps. On April 14, the XI and XII Corps were consolidated to form the XX Corps, and the regiment assigned to the 1st Brigade, 4th Division, XX Corps, and on April 23 was reported with 775 effectives.
