### Robert Jarman Civil War Records

Robert enlisted with Co. G, 4th Ark. Inf. at Washington, Ark. on Jan. 20, 1862 with his 2 half-brothers, Edward and Jackson Clingan. Robert was present on all roll cards until Feb. 6, 1864 when he deserted in Mississippi and returned to his home 3 miles N. E. of Nashville near Bingen. The 4th was on their way to the Atlanta, Ga. Campaign. Then Robert joined the 28th Ark. Inf. probably in time for the Red River Campaign. In Jan. 1865, Robert was captured at the White River and sent to Memphis, Tenn. and transferred to Alton Military Prison at Alton, ILL. arriving there on Jan. 17, 1865. He was probably released from prison in mid-June 1865. Robert was never listed as sick or wounded. With Roll cards only filled out every 60 days, it is possible.

Robert Jarman's brother-in-law James P. Askew was also in the 4th Ark. Inf. Co. E. James had 2 brothers, John and George also in the 4th. John and George both died of disease.

Robert Jarmon had a great-grandson, Charles Singleton who was killed in the Korean War Aug. 12, 1950. Charles was from Hempstead County, Ark.

### Jackson and Edward Clingan's Civil War Service Records:

Jackson and Edward Clingan joined The Davis Blues June 18, 1861 at Nashville, Ark. They mustered into Co. F, 5th Ark. Inf. for the period of 90 days. After the Battle of Oak Hill (Wilson's Creek, MO.), the Regt. voted to disband and they returned home. Jackson and Edward later joined Co. G, 4th Ark. Inf. Jan. 20, 1862 at Washington, Ark. for 6 months and 28 days. After the Battle of Elkhorn Tavern (Pea Ridge, Ark.), the 4th was ordered to Corinth, Miss. in April 1862. Edward and Jackson chose to not re-enlist and were left behind at Little Rock as hospital nurses. They both joined Co. H, 37th Ark. Inf. June 4, 1862 for 3 years. Edward was present on all Roll Cards to Feb. 29, 1864. From Feb. 28, 1863-Feb. 29, 1864, Jackson was listed as a teamster and was probably absent for some of the battles. Neither brother was ever listed as sick or wounded. They were in Marshall, Tex. at the time of the surrender on May 26, 1865. Edward received a Civil War pension August 13, 1915. On the pension, Edward stated that he was never wounded.

### James Hansford Holt Civil War Service Records:

Enlisted Feb. 26, 1862 at Nashville, Ark. into Co. I, Dawson's 19th Ark. Inf. at the age of 18. Present on all Roll Cards until Jan. 1863. Captured at Arkansas Post on Jan. 11, 1863.

Sent to Camp Douglas, Ill. Military Prison Feb. 8, 1863-May 21, 1863. James was sick when he was captured. Paroled and sent to City Point, Virginia May 21, 1863 to be exchanged. Furloughed from hospital June 1864. He most likely fought in the battles of the Atlanta Campaign. He possibly also fought at Franklin and Nashville, Tenn. Nov. and Dec. 1864.

Robert G. Jarman Lineage from John L. Jarman born 1790, Robert B. Jarman born before 1753, John Jarman born -unknown, Robert Jarman born 1680 and died 1761.

John L. Jarman born in North Carolina April 20, 1790; died October 1, 1860; buried in Ozan Cemetery, Bingen, Arkansas. Moved from Sevier County, Arkansas to Hempstead County, Arkansas in 1842; 1st marriage in Tennessee to unknown spouse.

Children of 1st Marriage of John L. Jarman and ???:

1. Elinor Jarman married ? Ward; had 3 children; Elinor and her husband both died before 1850.
2. Eliza Jarman married James G. McDonald; had 11 children; moved to north Texas in 1855. James and 2 of their sons were in the Civil War in Texas Calvary units. James was in the Home Guard.
3. Rebecca Jarman married James Sharp. Rebecca died before 1850. Had 4 children.4.
4. Phipina (Penny) (Pina) Jarman born 1823; married on October 15, 1848 to Media White in Hempstead County, Arkansas; moved to north Texas in 1852. Media was in Co. E, 16th Texas Calvary unit in the Civil War.
5. Sally Ann (Sarah) Jarman born 1827; married James P. Askew; Sarah was alive in the 1860 Census, but in 1862 when James signed up for the Indigent Families of Civil War Soldiers of Hempstead County, Arkansas, only their 6 children were listed. Sarah must have died between 1860-1862. James had 2 brothers who died in the Civil War with the 4th Arkansas Infantry.

John L. Jarman's 2nd Marriage was to Jane H. Marbury Clingan. Jane's parents were Benjamin Marbury who was born in North Carolina in 1784; died of small pox in 1838; married to Mary (Polly) Hoodenpyl who was born in North Carolina in 1793; died 1873. Benjamin Marbury fought in the Battle of New Orleans in 1815. Jane had 13 brothers and sister. Jane had 2 brothers, Leonard and Peter, who fought in the Civil War. Peter Marbury died of small pox at Camp Douglas, Illinois April 1863. Jane's grandfather, Leonard Marbury fought for 7 years in the Revolutionary War.

Jane H. Marbury married 1st to James Cowan Clingan; he died in Sevier County, Arkansas shortly after moving there from Tennessee.

Children of Jane H. Marbury and James Cowan Clingan:

1. Jackson Clingan 1831-1902; fought in Civil War; buried at Ozan Cemetery, Bingen, Arkansas; married Mary J. McClinton in 1853; they had 12 children.
2. Edward Clingan 1833-1925; fought in Civil War; buried at Ozan Cemetery, Bingen, Arkansas; married Louisa Craig in 1866; they had 5 children.
3. Malinda Clingan born 1829; married William B. Wicker who fought with Etter's Battery in Civil War. William lost 2 brothers in Civil War---Pleasant Wicker died at Arkansas Post; Joseph Wicker was killed at Holly Springs, Mississippi.
4. Mary Clingan married in 1843 to Joseph Doss/Dossey; moved to San Antonio, Texas in 1860.

Jane H. Marbury 2nd Marriage to John L. Jarman.

Children of Jane H. Marbury and John L. Jarman:

1. Robert G. Jarman 1840-Januray 1874; buried at Ozan Cemetery, Bingen Community, just northeast of Nashville, Arkansas.
2. John L. Jarman, Jr. 1847-1901; buried at Ozan Cemetery; married 1st to Susan Wicker; 2nd marriage to Josephine Wicker (Susan's sister).
3. Jane H. Jarman born 1850; married to Benjamin E. Mitchell; When the 1900 Census was taken, 3 of Jane and Benjamin's 5 children had already died.

Robert G. Jarman married 1st to Joyce Alabama Clark in 1870. Her father was David S. Clark who died of dysentery in Macon, Georgia in December 1863 while serving in Dawson's 19th Arkansas Infantry. Joyce died in 1872 of pneumonia. Robert and Joyce had no children.

On April 20, 1873, Robert G. Jarman married 2nd to Joyce's 1st cousin, Mary E. Clark. Mary was born in Mississippi in 1854; died 1913; buried at Yellow Creek Cemetery near Saratoga, Arkansas.

Mary E. Clark's parents were John Sebastin Clark born 1822 in Alabama; died 1876 in Nashville, Arkansas. He served in Dawson's 19th Arkansas Infantry. John S. Clark married Margaret Ann Teague born in Alabama in 1824. (Rumor has Margaret Ann being a quarter Cherokee.)

Child of Robert (Bob) G. Jarman and Mary E. Clark:

1. Robbie (Bobbie) Jarman (female) born June 1874; died February 28, 1958. Robert died of pneumonia 6 months before Robbie was born. Robbie had 4 children.
