PROMOTIONS—Col. Robert A. Smith, 2d Colonel of the 10th Miss. Regiment who commanded at the Battle of Shiloh, and led his men on Bragg's Kentucky Campaign, and engaged in the Battle of Munfordsville, where he was wounded and died two days after that battle, and remains were removed to Jackson and interred in the Cemetery. Col. James Barr, Jr., 3d Colonel of the 10th Miss. Regiment who succeeded Col. Smith was wounded in Georgia, died in hospital, and remains were sent to Jackson, and interred in the Cemetery. Col. George B. Myers, 4th Colonel of the 10th Miss. Regiment, was appointed to succeed Col. Barr, at Dalton, Ga., April 29, 1864, and was wounded and captured at Battle of Jonesboro, and sent as a prisoner to Johnson's Island. Returned home to Holly Springs and died since the war and was interred in the Cemetery. Lieutenant-Colonel L. G. Bulard also fell mortally wounded in the assault ordered by Brigadier-General Chalmers on Fort Craig, at the Battle of Munfordsville. His remains, together with other members of the Tenth Regiment who were killed, was with their army blankets wrapped around them buried in one long trench, near the ground where they fell, on the field of honor—the battle-field.

BATTLE OF CHICAMAUGA.

Extracts from Report of Lieut-Colonel James Barr, Tenth Mississippi Infantry. P. Anderson Brigada, Hindman Division.

On the morning of the 20th, was ordered forward as a supporting line to Brigadier-Generals Deas and Murgault. Arriving behind the first line under a heavy fire of small-arms and artillery, was ordered to charge the enemy, posted on a strong ridge with three pieces of cannon, one brass Parrott, one brass rifle, and one howitzer directly in front of the center of my regiment. My men answered to the call promptly, and nobly did they perform their duty, crossing over and beyond the first line of battle, driving the foe from their position, and shooting down the artilleryists at their guns, the last one being discharged when my men were within twenty paces of it, completely routing them, and forcing them to fall back across Lookout Mountain. This being done we moved some distance to the right and while marching across an open old field, were subjected to a heavy cross-fire from artillery, one shell bursting in the center of Co. D, wounding six men. We continued the fight for the balance of the day.

"I take great pleasure in mentioning for conspicuous bravery my Color-Sergeant, (Martin Denham, Co. D.) who was killed on the morning of the 20th, while carrying the standard well to the front; Private James Bridges, Co. H. and Color Corporal William Clark, Co. F. who gallantly carried the colors through the afternoon's fighting; and Sergeant James Franks, Co. E. Also for gallant conduct: Co. A. 1st Sergt. P. Bradley, Sergeants L. T. Glaze, J. O. Phillips, and Dean; Corporals Collins and Jackson, Privates Cooper, J. P. Walker, A. J. Bradford, J. L. McCaule, and D. Logan; Co. B. 1st Sergt. F. D. Chaplin and Sergeant Benzell, Corporals Douglass, C. Ensis, and S. Orr; Privates G. T. Eisele, C. C. Irvine, James Wright, William Wells, C. Jaquemine, and S. W. Griffen; Co. C. Privates Wm. F. BATTLE OF SHILOH.

Extracts from official report of Battle of Shiloh, of Major-General Bragg, Corps Commander: "Brigadier-General James R. Chalmers, at the head of his gallant Mississippians—filled he could not have exceeded the measure of my expectations. Never were troops and commanders more worthy of each other, and of their State."

BATTLE OF MURFREESBORO.

BATTLE MURFREESBORO, December 31, 1863.—Braxton Bragg, commanding A. of T., Polk's Corps, Hindman's Division.

Patton Anderson's Brigade Loss:—Three Officers; 7th Regiment, 113; 9th Regiment, 84; 10th Regiment, 54; 41st Regiment, 156; 44th Mississippi Regiment, 52; 96th Battalion Sharpshooters, 24 men. Garrigy Battery, 33 men.

BATTLE OF FRANKLIN.

BATTLE OF FRANKLIN.—Extract from report of Major-General Edward Johnson, Lee's Corps: "My division was moved forward to the attack, but owing to darkness and want of information as to locality, his attack was not felt by the enemy until about one hour after dark. This division then moved against the enemies breastworks under a heavy fire of artillery and musketry, driving the Federals from portions of their line. The brigades of Sharp and Brantly, (Mississippians,) particularly distinguished themselves. Their dead were mostly in the trenches, and on the breastworks of the enemy, where they nobly fell in a hand to hand conflict. Sharp captured 3 stands of colors, and Brantly was exposed to a severe enfilade fire. These noble Brigades never faltered in this terrible and bewildering night struggle."

BATTLE OF ATLANTA.

BATTLE ATLANTA, July 22 and 28—Gen John B. Hood, Army Commander, Hindman Division, Stewart's Corps, Army of Tenn. J. W. Tuckers Brigade Loss, Killed 16, wounded 118 men.
