4-1 JAMES WILLISON WHITE, son of Joseph White #3-1 and Elizabeth Lorimer, b. 1843 d. 1936 m. 13 Jan 1869 ROSANNAH "ROSE" BROWN STARRETT, b. 1847 d. 26 May 1914 age 66 yr. 7 mo. 8 days. James was a soldier in the civil war - was badly wounded in his right arm and almost died from fever in a southern hospital. As long as he lived he had continuous pain in his head. He learned to write with his left hand and learned telegraphy. Exerpt from a letter to his niece in 1925 portrays a typical character of his time; "...you can recall something, I of the 4th generation have performed for you in the way of a keepsake. which will enlighten you in regard to how some things were obtained before the fast age arrived, when pleasure was not the first on the program on the Lord's day. Teetotally yours . . ."

3-2 ALEXANDER WHITE, son of James White #2-2 and Elizabeth Willison,
 b. 26 Oct 1820 Washington Co. Pa., d. 8 Mar 1897 So. Omaha, Neb.
 m. 1847 O. Elizabeth Plummer Wycoff b. 1824 O., d. 1895. Alexander
 White served as a Private in the Civil War, Co. K 159th Regiment,
 Ohio Volunteers in 1864 for 100 days. Information taken from his
 military records show that he was a hotel keeper at the time he
 entered service and that he later became a farmer. He was 5' 11½",
 blue eyes and brown hair with fair complexion. He had later been
 attended by a physician at Dewitt, Iowa. He received a \$12 a month
 pension in 1892 until the time of his death. He lived at College Springs, Ia.

Amity Twnsp. "White, W.B. teacher, P.O. College Springs; was b. in
Wash. Co, Pa 12 Sept 1822. His father and mother, parents of 11
children, 7 sons and 4 dtrs. emigrated to Muskingum Co., O. in the
spring of 1826. He was a farmer and Willison B. White, his 3rd son,
labored on the farm until the age of 16, then entered Muskingum
College in 1843, rec'd an education that qualified him for a profession
of teacher; Obtained his scholarship by his own personal effort,
teaching in winter and attending college during the remainder of the
year. He taught in all grades of schools from the rural district up
to college; taught as an ass't with Rev. J.E. Alexander, in the
Miller Academy at Washington, O, then Sup't the Barnsville Union
Schools in Belmont, O. also New Concord Schools and the schools of
Quaker City, Guernsey Co., O. Commenced teaching in 1842 and taught in
Ohio until 1870, then removed to Page Co. Ia. purchased a farm in
Amity Twsp. erected comfortable buildings and put it under cultivation.
Continued teaching until 1875, having taught all 60 terms. During the
late war he served 4 yrs. and 4 mo. Enlisted at New Concord, Musking-
um Co, O. on the 9th day of Aug 1861 in the Ohio Vol. Infantry for
3 yrs. and at the expiration of this reinlisted at Strawbury Plains,
E. Tenn., for 3 yrs. longer, during which time he served as hospital
steward, caring for the sick and wounded in the field hospital and on
the battle ground and marched with the army, and had to be up to line
of battle in the hour of danger and assist in dressing the wounded.
Was under Rosecrans; then under Gen. Wm. Sherman and at the seige of
Nashville and the 2 days battle their under Gen. Thomas. Was in the
battle of Chickamauga, Chattanooga, Look Out Mountain, Missionary
Ridge, and 120 days in the Atlanta Campaign, and at the seige and taking
of the place. He also participated in the battle of Franklyn and the
demoralizing of Hood's Army at Nashville and after the surrender of
Lee, his reg. with some others, was ordered to Texas; landed on the
8th of July, marched to Green Lakes, and went into camp for a few days.
Then took up their line of March for San Antonio, Garrisoned that place
until the 15th of Dec 1865. Orders came to muster out; took up line of
march to the gulf, and reached Colombus, Ohio, Dec. 25 1865, rec'd
pay and discharge and arrived home to greet dear friends." His brother,
Alexander filled out a military affidavit stating that Willison had
an attack of typhoid fever at Green River, Ken. and that he, Alex., was
called to nurse him at Louisville, Ken. He also stated that Willison
had such a severe sunstroke in Texas that he had never fully recovered
from it. Willison rec'd an \$8 a mo. pension in 1888. His picture is in
Chap. II-C.

Isaac White is listed as a student at the time he entered the
Civil War Aug 1861. He served in the same Co. as his brother,
Willison, both for a term of over 4 years, as Pvt. in Co. A 15th
Reg. Ohio Infantry Volunteers. His service covered the Battle of
Shiloh, Seige of Cornith, capture near Lawrenceburg at Rough and
Ready, Ky. on the prisoner of war records, released in 2 days,
Battle at Liberty Gap, Chickamauga, Mission Ridge, thru out the
entire summer campaign of 1864 from Chattanooga to Atlanta and the
battle of Nashville. He was given a \$6 a mo. pension in 1890. His
(One account says he died of food poisoning.)

widow rec'd a \$10 pension in 1900 and her pension was raised to \$40 in 1928, which she collected until her death in 1946. Isaac's main complaint was disability due to severe sunstroke and typhoid fever. He came to Iowa Co, Ia. where he taught as a single man for several years. After his marriage he settled in Hartwick, Ia. as a farmer. There are affidavits signed by brothers in most all of this families Civil War records. I.O. White has signed a paper in 1887 from Folsom, Custer Co., Dak. Territory. Following is the list of inventory from his farm in 1900: 65 acres S.W. 16-81-13, 1 yearling colt, 2 horses, 2 yearling heifers, 6 cows, 1 steer, 1 bull, and 7 swine. Isaac had grey eyes, sandy hair, fair complexion and was 6' 3½" tall. Edna McCorkle #5-27 remembered him as being very tall when he visited Ohio around 1890. Picture in Chap. II-C Signature:




