

James W. White, 92, Civil War Veteran, Dies At Rix Mills


One of the few remaining names on the rolls of the veterans of the Civil War was stricken from the earthly records when James W. White who had lived as a retired farmer near Rix Mills died at the home of his son, J. Maurice White, Monday morning at 9 o'clock.

Mr. White, who was 92 years old, succumbed as the result of an attack of pneumonia.

When the Civil War began, Mr. White soon heard the call of patriotism, and decided to enlist. This he did, joining the Fifteenth Ohio Volunteers Infantry, Company A on September 8, 1862.

Injured at the battle of Murfreesboro in Tennessee, he spent several months recovering in a hospital before being discharged April 15, 1863.

Again he felt his country needed



him putting aside thoughts about his injuries and suffering, he reenlisted in his company on January 15, 1864, to serve to the ending of the conflict.

With his passing went the last surviving veteran of the company.

Mr. White was a member of the G. A. R., Hazlett Post of Zanesville. He was a member of the United Presbyterian church in Norwich at an early age, transferring to the Rix Mills church when it was organized and remained active in it to the time of his last illness.

He was active in general community affairs, and became widely known. His passing will be regreted deeply by his many friends and acquaintances.
