



 - 16 categories currently available, with more in development



National Register new guidance vehicle: Best Practices Review

A new publication illustrating National Register guidance by providing examples from recent nominations

- Typically 5 to 6 pages of text and images, focused on a single issue, with citations to National Register Bulletins
- First issue released September 2022
 - Evaluating Non-Historic Exteriors
- New issues released quarterly
 - Evaluating Garages and Outbuildings in Historic Districts
 - Amending National Register Documentation
 - Evaluating Common Resources
 - Preparing a Concise Significance Statement
- All available at National Register Publications (nps.gov)



National Register communications: E-Blast

Long-standing newsletter-type quarterly publication for the historic preservation professional, focused on National Register program issues and nomination technical issues

- Articles prepared by National Register staff
- Typically 3 to 5 pages of text and images
- Circulation of 400+ individuals
- Distributed via email to SHPOs, THPOs, FPOs, and others upon request
- First issued in 2009, 508 compliance and index of all issues in development

Enhanced E-Filing System Now Accepting Submissions

Based on the popularity and feedback received on the electronic submission process, the National Park Service land, and in the proved system, the Cultural Resource Submission Platform (CRSP, or "crisp"). As of September 16, 2022, nominating authorities have been able to register and submit their requests for National Register actions via a system with no file size limitations or photograph restrictions, and which includes added amenities such automatic acknowledoment of received.


As our preservation partners are aware, in April of 2020 the National Register program initiated an electroniconly submission process in response to the COVID-19 global pandemic, which imposed telework status on many state, federal, and Tribal agency staff. Given the speed with which that system was mounted, it imposed file-size and other limitations. The new expanded CRSP system allows for the regular submission of photographs without the count limitations imposed by the earlier electronic engl submission promy submission promy shumpission promy submission promy shumpission shumpissio

With the exception of those without reliable high speed internet access, all nominating authorities should now use CRSP to transmit their full submissions for National Register actions to the National Park Service Please note that CRSP is available only to nominating authorities (e.g., NPS-approved SHPO, FPO, and THPO staff, not consultants or consultants or consultants or nominating authorities for all requests for National Register actions, including nominations for lishing, requests for removal, Additional Documentation, Boundary Changes, Determinations of Eligibility ice Additionally, twoque CRSP, nominating authorities can submit the materials that were not included in the file-size-limited submissions made between April 10, 2020, and September 15, 2020.

Debating District Boundaries

District boundaries have long been a topic of much interest when it comes to the National Register of Historic Please. Nominations switmited in the carry years of the program did not always clearly describe boundaries or they provide imprecise limits, which can be finantizing for someon warning to know if their property is in a listed district or not. This is additionally problematic for Section 106 and historic tax credit processes for the same reasons. National Register Bulletin 21: Defining Boundaries for National Register Properties (the Boundaries Bulletin) states at page 2:

Areas that have lost integrity because of changes in cultural features or setting should be excluded when they are at the periphery of the eligible resources. When such areas are small and surrounded by eligible resources, they may not be excluded, but are included as noncontributing resources of the property.

The term "surrounded by" typically refers to "doutt lobes," which are not allowed and are further discussed in the boxed act on page 2 of the Boundaries Bulletin. Passing of Retired NPS Historian Harry Butowsky



National Park Service Historian Harry A. Butowsky passed away on May 6, 2023. Bom in Philadelphia, Fennsylvania, Mr. Butowsky carned a B.A. from the University of Pennsylvania, and a P.B.L. from the University of lilmois. 
