On behalf of North Carolina's Department of Natural and Cultural Resources, I would like to share the following initial recommendations for the implementation of President Biden's Executive Order 14121 (Recognizing and Honoring Women's History).

The Pauli Murray Family Home in Durham was designated as a National Historic Landmark in 2016 and is home to the Pauli Murray Center for History and Social Justice. This National Historic Landmark could provide a multitude of opportunities to highlight women's history in the United States through the lens of Murray's groundbreaking civil rights activism and legal scholarship.

There is abundant opportunity to highlight important figures and chapters in women's history at North Carolina's National Park System units and National Historic Landmarks. Many of North Carolina's National Historic Landmarks are owned and managed by our department and are the focus of our ongoing efforts to highlight untold and under-told stories of women's history. Our staff is available and ready to assist with identifying these stories in whatever format is most helpful for your efforts moving forward.

We look forward to helping ensure North Carolinians are well represented in the development of an overview theme study specific to women's history. One site managed by our Department that may be of particular interest is the Charlotte Hawkins Brown Museum at Palmer Memorial Institute in Sedalia. Other North Carolina sites that are home to significant women's history stories and have been mentioned in recent theme studies include Bennett College in Greensboro (The Era of Reconstruction: 1861-1900) and the History House Museum in Tillery (Labor History in the United States).

Staff from across our department are excited by and appreciative of the directives in Executive Order 14121 and look forward to collaborating with the National Park Service to celebrate and highlight the contributions that women in North Carolina have made to our country. My character-driven program engages students in math on maps of the world. Traveling Miss T.'s "Math Maps" is an interdisciplinary approach to bringing all NPS sites into the classroom through Math Standards.

I have developed the **only** educational program since Junior Rangers that can be systemic, yet customized, while aligning in math, social studies, literacy, and science standards that requires *no implementation* for teachers or interpreters.

To quote the order, "Women and girls of all backgrounds have shaped our country's history, from the ongoing fight for justice and equality to cutting-edge scientific advancements and artistic achievements. Yet these contributions have often been overlooked..." I feel as though my work is being overlooked, and I want you to notice what I have created. I can truly make a difference with support and approval from the NPS.

I have already made my signature "Math Maps" for a number of NPS sites, and developed a full program for the Denali Education Center, which embeds a virtual field trip to Denali National Park at each coordinate point of interest. I am currently working with The EcoLogik Institute at Cabrillo National Monument to implement the same program. I am confident my partners across sites, *including Rosie the Riveter Trust*, would have nothing but positive things to say about my innovative curriculum and true expertise when it comes to writing, marketing, and implementing programming for students nationwide.
