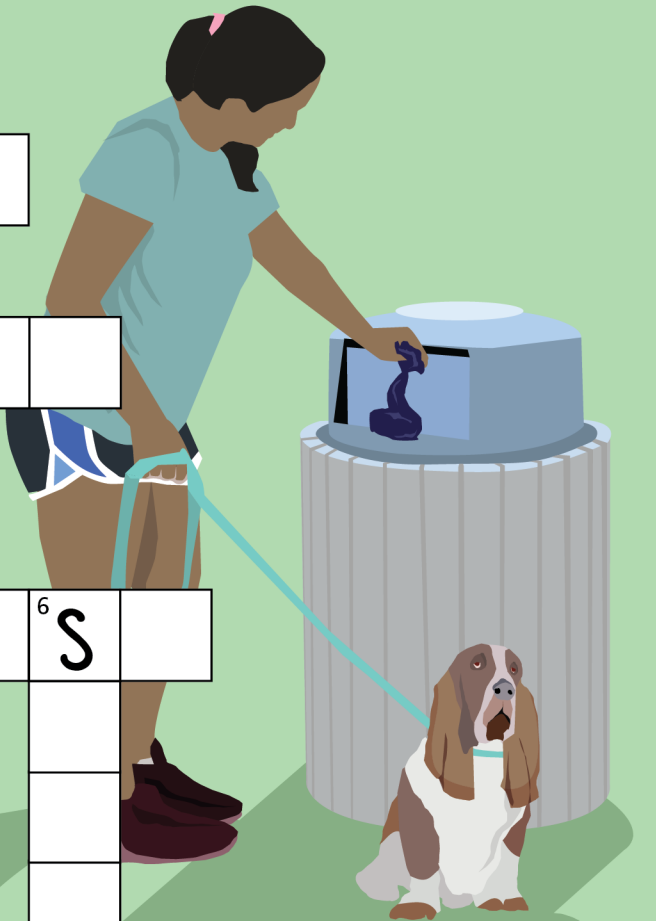
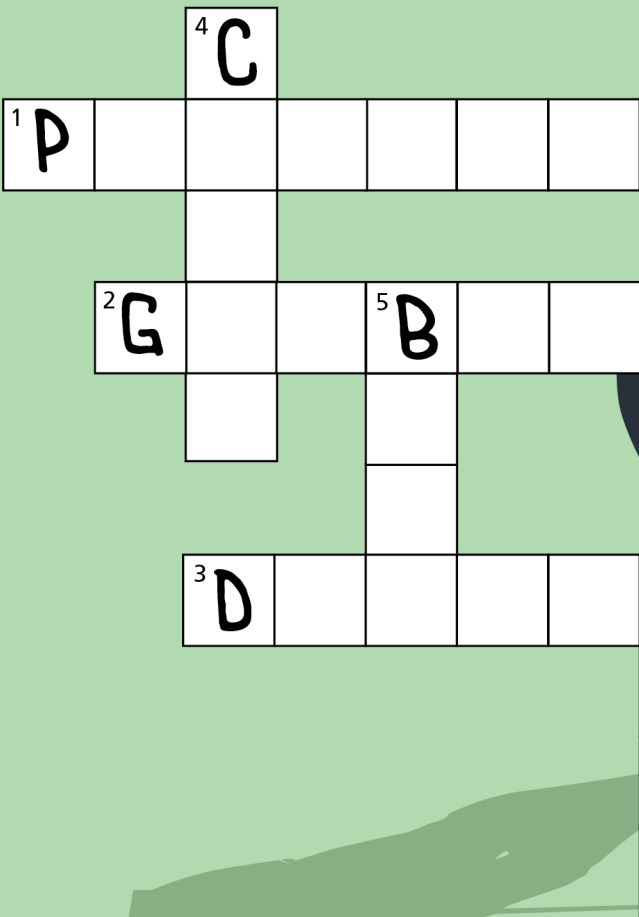

is leashed, they really stress me out.

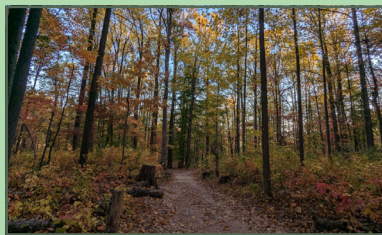




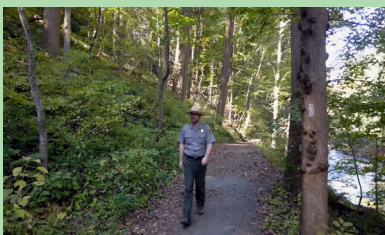

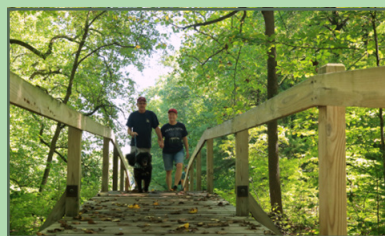

Know where you can go.





On January 6, 1778 a memorandum was issued at Valley Forge offering a 20 dollar reward for the return of a "White Painted Dog" belonging to Captain Bayly of the 7th Maryland Regiment.

Baron von Steuben was well known for traveling with a "large, spoiled Italian dog," possibly a type of greyhound, named Azor, who accompanied him wherever he went. General Steuben's aid, Duponceau, once described Azor as having "an excellent ear for music" because the dog would bark and howl in response to bad singing.



Continental soldier Joseph Plumb Martin recalled a large bulldog present at the siege of Yorktown, three years after Valley Forge. He wrote that every time the British fired, the dog would follow their shots across the American trenches. The officers wanted to send him back with a message, but he was "too formidable."

While a prisoner of the British army, General Charles Lee wrote to Washington to request that his dogs be sent to him in New York, stating that he had "never stood in greater need of their Company." His Pomeranian, Spado, accompanied him on all of his military campaigns.
