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THE PRESIDENT'S SPEECH.

A marked sincerity and frankness was remarked by all who heard the speech of our Commander-in-Chief yesterday. President Harding said that the United States Navy should be the greatest instrument of peace in the world and that he hoped she would not never be called upon to fire a gun at an enemy ship. He said: "The United States does not desire anything which is not rightfully hers, but she does want that which is hers by right, and by the Great Eternal, she intends to have it. President Harding reminded the officers of the Navy of the trust bestowed upon them in the confidence of one hundred and ten million people of the United States had in the Officers and men of the Navy.

He concluded his speech by saying that in the past, he had not been much of a seafaring man, but now, as Commander-in-Chief of the Navy he intended to keep the First line of Defense always before him.

Admiral Wilson then proposed three cheers for President Harding and all hands gave three hearty cheers.

NAVAL REVIEW.

The President was greeted yesterday by, battleships, destroyers and submarines on the water and hydroplanes, aeroplanes and dirigibles in the air. The long column of ships steaming up the bay made a very impressive sight, and as each battleship passed the MAYFLOWER she fired a salute of 21 guns. Besides the MAYFLOWER, there was the SYLPH, the Secretary of the Navy's yacht, which brought Secretary Denoy and Admiral Koontz, Chief of Naval Operations to the review.

The display of Flags, as each ship came to anchor and full dressed ship added color to the harbor. Doubtless many of us have never seen so many different flags flying, at the "fore" of the various battleships. For instance there was the Presidential Flag, the Secretary of the Navy's flag, the Assistant Secretary of the Navy's Flag, a senior and junior Admiral's flag, a Vice Admiral's flag, a senior and junior Rear Admiral's flag, all flying at one time from the various ships in the harbor.
