HISTORY

Horace Marden Albright was born in Bishop, California, on January 6, 1890. After receiving a law degree and passing the bar in both Washington D.C., and California, in 1914, Albright began working as a legal assistant to Stephan Mather, assistant secretary of the Department of the Interior in charge of national parks. In 1916, the National Park Service was established with Mather as director. When Mather was away or ill, Albright filled in as acting director. During his time as legal assistant and acting director of the park service, Albright was especially effective in acquiring additional lands for national parks

From 1919 through 1929, Albright was the Superintendent of Yellowstone National Park where he and his growing family lived in Mammoth Hot Springs. During his time as superintendent, Albright initiated some of the first NPS historic preservation and conservation policies and was very active in helping spur the creation of other parks. Because of his knowledge and success, national park employees as well as government officials kept in regular contact with him asking for advice. It was also during this time that Albright forged a friendship with John D. Rockefeller, Jr., who owned large portions of Jackson Hole and what is today Grand Tetons National Park. In 1929, Albright was named the second director of the National Park Service. He filled this position until 1933, when he resigned to work for United States Potash Company and U.S. Borax and Chemical Corporation, moving back to California at that time. Despite having left government work and the National Park Service, Albright was still routinely contacted by various officials with questions about park business, particularly regarding the expansion and creation of parks. He was also involved with the creation of the Jackson Hole National Monument and proposed boundary changes for Grand Teton National Park.

The enlargement of the Grand Tetons and the creation of the Jackson Hole National Monument was controversial as local land owners and ranchers rallied against Rockefeller's alleged illegal land grabbing tactics and the enlargement of the current park, which would reduce ranch sizes and ban cattle grazing. Politicians, local newspapers, and ranchers in Jackson Hole regularly attacked Albright's stance on the issues, his friendship with Rockefeller, and his disconnect with the local people and lands. Despite the bad press and ill will towards Albright by some Wyoming residents, Albright stood his ground and enjoyed the support of numerous politicians, including President Roosevelt, who vetoed numerous bills attempting to recall the creation of the Jackson Hole National Monument. By 1950, the Jackson Hole National Monument was abolished, but the Grand Tetons National Park boundaries were expanded to include this land and much more.

Horace Albright continued to collect newspaper clippings, journal and magazine articles, and other forms of press regarding Jackson Hole and the Grand Tetons after the 1950s and also remained in contact with many of his political and NPS contacts until his death on March 27, 1987, in California.

DESCRIPTION This collection includes correspondences, newspaper clippings, and photographs collected by Horace Albright during his time as park superintendant and after his retirement from the National Park Service.

The Horace M. Albright papers consist of personal papers collected by him, including correspondence, newspaper clippings, journal and magazine articles, and photographs. The papers span the years of his work in the National Park Service as well as the many years following his retirement and reflect the interest he maintained in the NPS, its employees, and its mission throughout his life.

The photographs are a variety of portraits, events, and other images collected by Albright. Although many images are NPS photographs, it is assumed that the images in this collection were personal copies. The photographs depict the Albright family, Albright in his professional role, and a variety of dignitaries including Presidents Warren G. Harding and Calvin Coolidge as well as Senator Gerald Nye, writer George P. Putman and his "Rough Writers," and Edmund Seymour, president of the American Bison Society. Events include several seasonal openings of the Park, most at the Roosevelt Arch; the dedication of the Buffalo Bill Museum in Cody, Wyoming; a Native American ceremony at the West Gate; and several reenactments of what is now known as the "Campfire Myth".

The correspondence documents Albright's wide and lengthy involvement in National Park Service politics and issues, especially as they pertain to new parks and to boundary issues. In this collection, the primary area of discussion is the creation and expansion of Jackson Hole Monument and Grand Teton National Park. There is also some correspondence with individual park employees requesting advice and maintaining personal relationships.

There are also research materials, including news clippings and articles, pertaining to ongoing boundary and land use issues within Grand Teton National Park and the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem.

This collection will be of use not only to biographers of Horace M. Albright, but to those who are interested in the creation of national parks and monuments, the history of the National Park Service, the development of the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem concept, and NPS relationships with in-holders, gateway communities, and the general public.
