Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the National Register Multiple Property nomination for Yosemite National Park. I concur that the properties identified and evaluated in the nomination do constitute a coherent group of geographically dispersed resources that are eligible for listing in the National Register. The nomination does an excellent job of defining separate, but related contexts that make clear the significance of the individual resources, as well as the reasons that they collectively constitute a multiple property. The inclusion of a number of the park's less elaborate, high altitude resources is particularly noteworthy. The context statements synthesize a large amount of historic documentation in a clear and concise manner and the descriptive material that is provided for the individual resources or resource groupings is excellent.

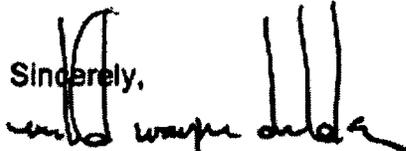

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Summary

Silver mining operations took place in the Tioga Mining District during the late 1800s, producing the short-lived settlements of Dana and Bennettville. Although the period of active mining in the areas of Tioga Pass and Mono Pass was brief, there are prominent ruins and a few good examples of mining structures remaining, particularly in the areas developed as the Golden Crown Mine and Dana Village. These are wooden or stone structures in various stages of collapse, including cabins, a blacksmith shop, a powder house, and a lift house.

General Description

The Golden Crown Mine is located at Mono Pass, just off the trail at the head of Bloody Canyon on the boundary of Yosemite National Park. The elevation is c. 11000 ft.

Today the remains of this mine consist of five log structures: a shaft house, and a row of four cabins.

The shaft house is a one-story, one-room log structure measuring c. 10'x12'. It is made of peeled round logs, joined with a V-notch joint; the roof is collapsed. The building surrounds/a mine shaft which is lined with vertical logs.

About 100' south of the shaft house is a row of four log cabins, evidently built for habitation. Cabin No. 1, on the east end of the row, and Cabin No. 4 on the west end, are similar in size and construction. Each cabin measures c. 10' square and is a one-story, one-room building. Each cabin has a door and window opening on the north side. The cabins consist of peeled round logs laid on alternating tiers and joined with a V-notch joint. Both cabins are in ruins, but are stable and not deteriorating at a rapid rate. Cabin No. 2 is a one-story, two-room cabin, measuring c. 25'x 12'. It consists of peeled round logs laid on alternating tiers and joined with a V-notch joint. This cabin is also roofless.

Cabin No. 3 is a one-story, one-room log structure measuring c. 10' square. The cabin is made of logs both round and hand-hewn; the hewn logs are used primarily on the north side; The logs are laid on alternating tiers and the corners are joined with a half lap joint, and the spaces between the logs are chinked with split log wedges. The cabin has a door opening and a contiguous window opening on the north side. The cabin has a gable roof, with its roof poles in place.

Significance

Property Type: Resources Associated with Settlement and Industry (1851-1951)  
Subtype: Exploration, Settlement, and Resource Exploitation  
Period of Significance: 1874-1899

The significance of properties relating to settlement and resource exploitation is derived from the themes of economic development in the western United States and the resulting transformation of the environment, as well as attitudes towards the environment. These themes demonstrate the processes by which the Yosemite region became tied to the local, regional, and national economies through industry and transportation. The demand for minerals and lumber was driven by needs originating far beyond Yosemite's immediate environs, and could be driven by developments in financial markets a continent away. The presence of extractive industries in the Sierra was symptomatic of the growing population in California and the greater Western region, and points to the far-reaching effects of urbanization. The golden Crown Mine is illustrative of the high altitude mining camps that once straddled the main crest of the Sierra Nevada. The mine complex is unusually intact, and the best preserved of the mining sites in Yosemite.

Context

The mining camp was established in 1879 by Orlando Fuller. There were actually three contiguous claims: the Ella Bloss, Ella Bloss #2, and Golden Crown. The names were used interchangeably in mining reports although referring essentially to this one site. There are a few brief references to the Golden Crown in the *Mammoth City Herald* of August and September, 1879, predicting the great wealth to be obtained from the mine however, the reports proved false. The last recorded assessment for the mine was in 1890 with promising results but no recorded returns.

The setting of the Golden Crown is historic of and by itself. Located at Mono Pass, at the head of Bloody Canyon, it is just off the traditional trade route of the Mono Indians, and is also the route used by Lt. Tredwell Moore when pursuing the fleeing Yosemite Indians in 1852. Moore noted several mineral deposits on his return to Yosemite Valley via the same route.

It is a strenuous hike from the Dana meadows side of Mt. Gibbs to Mono Pass, and even more difficult to follow the route up Bloody Canyon to the mine. For those who can make the journey the mine complex is a valuable interpretive tool for explaining both prehistoric and historic aspects of Yosemite's past.
